MESSAGE FROM FR DUANE



This Sunday is "Social Justice Sunday", when the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference publishes an annual Social Justice Statement. This year's statement is entitled "Signs of Hope on the Edge: Serving Homeless People with

Mental III-Health". It is a very powerful and practical statement which contains reflection questions throughout, and I encourage you all to read and engage with the statement prayerfully and reflectively. The Australian Bishops quote Pope Benedict XVI who wrote powerfully in his encyclical "Deus Caritas Est (God is Love)": "Love for widows and orphans, for prisoners, and the sick and needy of every kind, is as essential to [the Church] as the ministry of the sacraments and preaching of the Gospel. The Church cannot neglect the service of charity any more than she can neglect the Sacraments and the Word."

Having studied psychology previously and having worked with many people with mental ill-health throughout my own ministry, I was greatly encouraged by the honest insights provided by this Social Justice Statement, where the Bishops describe some of the tragic realities facing some of our most vulnerable brothers and sisters in their times of greatest need. The Bishops also remind us of the genuine hope that Christ provides, especially through us, the Church. The Church is already making a genuine, lasting difference in so many lives, especially through the work of the St Vincent De Paul Society – and I also take this opportunity to thank you for your generous support to the Winter Appeal last weekend (which can of course continue in the weeks to come). I am also eager to see how we might be able to respond to the call of the Australian Bishops not only as individuals but as a parish community. The Social Justice Statement extends throughout 2025-2026 (until Social Justice Sunday next year) and we will be seeking to provide opportunities to engage more deeply with shared reflection and action based upon this statement in the year ahead. POPE LEO'S MESSAGE FOR 2025 WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR THE CARE OF CREATION

"Environmental justice — implicitly proclaimed by the prophets — can no longer be regarded as an abstract concept or a distant goal. It is an urgent need that involves much more than simply protecting the environment. For it is a matter of justice — social, economic and human. For believers it is also a duty born of faith, since the universe reflects the face of Jesus Christ, in whom all things were created and redeemed. In a world where the most vulnerable of our brothers and sisters are the first to suffer the devastating effects of climate change, deforestation and pollution, care for creation becomes an expression of our faith and humanity."

ACT FOR GAZA

As atrocities in Gaza continue, we can feel overwhelmed. Caritas suggests ways in which we can take action: sign the Pledge for Peace (by this Sunday); pray in solidarity with the people of Gaza; read messages from the churches of Jerusalem; light a candle and share a simple rice meal as you acknowledge the suffering of the Palestinian people. A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

On a sabbath day Jesus had gone for a meal to the house of one of the leading Pharisees; and they watched him closely. He then told the guests a parable, because he



had noticed how they picked the places of honour. He said this, 'When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take your seat in the place of honour. A more distinguished person than you may have been invited, and the person who invited you both may come and say, "Give up your place to this man." And then, to your embarrassment, you would have to go and take the lowest place. No; when you are a guest, make your way to the lowest place and sit there, so that, when your host comes, he may say, "My friend, move up higher." In that way, everyone with you at the table will see you honoured. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the man who humbles himself will be exalted.'

Then he said to his host, 'When you give a lunch or a dinner, do not ask your friends, brothers, relations or rich neighbours, for fear they repay your courtesy by inviting you in return. No; when you have a party, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; that they cannot pay you back means that you are fortunate, because repayment will be made to you when the virtuous rise again.'
